There is no bus service and certainly no taxis nearby, so getting into shops and services is difficult. On several occasions I was able to pick up Phil and take him to the closest township to access services and to enjoy lunch and fellowship together. The travel in the car, 45 minutes each way, was filled with Christian discussion and prayer.

Phil has kindly commented:

"Kim coming to visit has been like sunshine on a cloudy day, not just him visiting but the warmth of his character. The strength I get from talking about our Lord and Heavenly Father, and His work in our lives is such a lifeline. Through Kim's visits God displays love, friendship and kindness. ANZAC Day in Beltana

What a privilege it was to travel to Beltana, South Australia to conduct their ANZAC Day dawn service on behalf of the Presbyterian Inland Mission.

The outback town of Beltana is where John Flynn was ministering at the Smith of Dunesk Mission in 1911-1912 when he wrote his report to the Presbyterian Church of Australia regarding the need for outback ministry. His report was presented in 1912 and resulted in the formation of Australian Inland Mission, which continues today as the Presbyterian Inland Mission.

The ANZAC Day service began as the sun was making an appearance over the horizon, and was attended by over 50 people - not bad for a town with a population of 26!

We were able to read from Scripture, sing hymns, pray and present a short Gospel message. Members of the community laid a wreath and raised the flags from halfmast. The traditional Last Post and Reveille were played and the Ode of Remembrance recited. The service finished as all present joined in singing the Australian National Anthem. Following the service, the Beltana Progress Association put on a breakfast in Beltana's Assembly Hall, where we were able to meet and talk with people from the local area, as well as those who had travelled from Adelaide, interstate and even overseas! There were many stories to be shared and PIM were made very welcome.

Although it is a long time since John Flynn was in Beltana, it is a joy to know that there are still opportunities to share the Gospel. Let us pray that the Lord will work in the hearts of those present on ANZAC Day and with the people with whom we shared.

Meet Graham and Fran



Graham and Fran are members of the PIM Nomads Network, which trains and supports those spending time on the road to use their gifts and abilities for serving Christ and his church. At the March training event at New Dunesk we took some time to ask them a few questions:

Graham – Tell us about what you do in retirement.

From 2014 we have been supporting small country churches that are struggling. Many cannot afford ministry, so Fran and I like to go and support them and give some encouragement. Many lay leaders get tired, so we seek to give them some relief from carrying the burden. As a retired Pastor, I'm happy to preach and lead them in worship.

Fran – How do you support the churches you are working with?

Graham does the preaching, but we are always there as a team. I support him however I can, but especially with the pastoral visiting. We are always a compassionate ear and where appropriate, we offer needed guidance and encouragement from God's word. I was a former community nurse, so I can offer practical suggestion to help them with life and we find that often people will initiate gospel conversations on life and eternity.

Fran and Graham – what advice would you give to people who are on holidays or traveling in their retirement years?

Use the skills and abilities that God has given you. For some it may be hospitality, for others it may be engaging in conversation. Also, visit the local country churches and be an encouragement to them. Wherever you are, invest in people, talk to the locals, pray for opportunities to share your faith. We have always looked for mission opportunities, we would encourage others to have this mindset too.
