

New life in Mount Magnet

There has been wonderful traction over the past twelve months in Mt Magnet as Alvin and Narelle continue to minister to the local community.

The church is well attended, averaging 20-30 local people on a weekly basis, sometimes with visitors from other areas. The Sunday school ministry has also grown since it was incorporated into the adult service, and the new curriculum is helping to ensure the kids are growing in their knowledge of the Lord Jesus.

A local Indigenous lady recently commented "I've never seen so many people at church, and I've been here all my life!"

For a small town of around 380 people, this is extremely encouraging.

Earlier in May, the church had the privilege of celebrating new life as they witnessed two baptisms: a baby girl of two church attendees and a newly bornagain local woman who has faithfully been attending Mt Magnet church and Bible study this past year. It was a joyful and wonderful celebration of God's gracious covenant.

Alvin's work continues to revolve around evangelism and discipleship. Recently, he and Cecilia, the only active Christian Badimaya in town, launched a backyard Sunday service for their Indigenous friends. The most recent session was attended by seven indigenous people. Towards the end of the service, Jacinta, another Badimaya, decided to commit her life to Christ. In her words "I want to put my faith in Jesus. I know He is my Lord and my Saviour, and I want to turn my life around for Him."

Jacinta and her partner have been meeting with Alvin for Bible study and counselling. Praise the Lord for displaying His love and mercy to this precious couple! Alvin has requested prayer for them that they will "grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Pet 3:18).

God's faithfulness has been evident in Mount Magnet, from his general provision to saving grace. To see his work in transforming not only the landscape with rain but also the lives of his people for eternity is nothing short of miraculous. Please pray for the gospel ministry in Mount Magnet, that they may continue to serve the Lord with joy and perseverance. He is good and worthy to be praised.

From the patrols

God's strength on the road

Kim Jaeger, PIM worker in Tasmania, writes:



"Look to the Lord and his strength; seek his face always" Psalm 105:4. This verse was so relevant to me, four years ago when I was starting in patrol work. Each day was what we call 'cold calling'. Every visit to a rural home was a new face and I had no idea what to expect when I drove through a gate or knocked on a door. This is a common experience for new PIM teams, and the first year of a new PIM patrol was largely made up of visiting strangers.

One day I was calling on homes along a rural gravel road which wound itself along the bottom of a valley. I found that either no one was at home when I knocked on the front door or the farm gates leading to the houses were chained and locked. I was unable to

visit. Suddenly, a wave of fear came over me and I irrationally thought that everyone on that road would be my enemy. The overwhelming urge was to turn around and drive home. I pulled up on the side of the road and literally did what Psalm 105:4 tells us to do. I sought the face of God and looked to his strength.

As the Bible promises, God strengthened and sustained me so I was able to keep going. The next two visits that day established two of my best rural relationships. One of these, Dave, has now become a good friend. Initially, we met occasionally but now we meet each month and send text messages between visits. We discuss many things including the things of God and the Gospel message. Dave says I am further along the road on spiritual matters than he is, so I continue to pray that he will come to know Jesus personally. Dave shows lots of interest in my patrol work and is a great encouragement to me.

God's strength on that day four years ago has led to a firm friendship today, mutual encouragement and Gospel witness. It is definitely worth driving for.
