Each tour group came back with glowing reviews, having learned more about the property and the terrain that patrol workers travel on every day.

Despite the heat of the afternoon sun, New Dunesk managers Paul and Janae Denness worked hard to ensure everyone was having a great time, providing cooling refreshments and delicious treats throughout the day. The chatter of voices throughout the campground during dinner soon turned to booming voices from the piggery singing hymns of praise. A setting sun over the paddocks of New Dunesk marked the beginning of the official proceedings for the night.

PIM Convener Vaughan Smith led a service of praise and celebration, with CEO Andrew Letcher providing an enlightening reflection on the history of PIM, and a look forward to the future at New Dunesk. The Rev Peter Barnes, Moderator-General of the Presbyterian Church of Australia, preached an encouraging reminder of the power of the Gospel from Acts 8, before officially marking the opening of the property.

The night concluded with dessert and a bonfire under the Southern Cross, a fitting backdrop for such a momentous occasion in both PIM's history and future for Gospel work in inland Australia.

# **On patrol with Laurie**



Laurie Peake recently spoke to PIM about his patrols in South West Queensland.

A long serving worker for PIM, Laurie's stories are an insightful glimpse into just how hard the PIM Ministry Teams work to bring the Gospel to inland Australia.

On the particular patrol that Laurie recounted for us, he passed by five properties before finding someone to talk to. It's a tough gig that requires both fortitude and determination to press on. But somehow Laurie always does, stating "But there will be a next time and a few more after that also". Despite these initial setbacks, Laurie had many positive encounters on his patrol with both new acquaintances and old friends.

He came across a Christian couple who were considering becoming caretakers of a property which, as Laurie put it, would "bring some saltiness into this wilderness". He was able to pray for a pregnant lady who he knew had waited a long time for a child. And finally, he came across a couple he had met only once before, but who were eager to pick up a previous conversation about God and learn more about what it means to be a Christian.

Laurie summed it up well when he said "Now that sort of visit is truly worth driving for." Praise God for our Ministry Teams and their commitment to the work of the Gospel.
