I am conducting a weekly Bible Study with four Christians near Tunnack. This also serves as a fruitful time of spiritual support, fellowship and prayer.



R'jaye writes about his day on patrol.

On a mild winter's morning in June, I had the privilege of spending the day with Kim in the Midlands area. Our day took us around the area of Levendale and Tunnack. Although our first visit did not eventuate (there was no one home), we soon gathered in a warm house with a couple and their neighbour for a hot drink and a Bible study. I can tell that Kim had built a friendship with them over many months. They are Christians, who like us in the suburbs are experiencing the challenges of life; work, family relationships and faith. In regards to faith, being far from a church community to be involved with, having Kim visit regularly keeps them grounded in the Word as they grow in Christ.

We moved on to another home, again empty. This seems to be a big challenge in Kim's rounds, so he needs to be flexible around empty houses, busy farmers, those uninterested, short visits and long visits. No two days look the same. Next was a couple (who are not Christians) who invited us into their house. Kim has been getting to know them for over a year. As they shared some of their hopes and dreams for themselves and their children, they recognised that there were some answers to prayer from Kim's previous visits. At the end of a long conversation, the couple were willing to be prayed for and already look forward to another visit from Kim.

During the cold, windy and showery afternoon, two more houses were visited. At each one, we had a short conversation but weren't invited in. Through ongoing visits, relationships can build and shorter doorstep conversations can lead to longer and deeper indoor discussions.

On this particular patrol, we didn't get a chance to do "cold-calling", that is for another time. I believe Kim's willingness and openness to witness and share the gospel to people in the Midlands is a testimony to the power of the Holy Spirit in him. Jesus said, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."
